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Highland Dance School 24 Oct



I regularly attend day courses organised by various branches of the RSCDS. The one I try never to miss is the Highland and Ladies Step Day School put on twice each year by the Leeds branch. The course provides a morning class aimed at beginners, and an afternoon session for dancers with more experience. However, most dancers can learn a lot from both sessions and many do in fact stay for the whole day.

The most recent of these courses was on 24 October 2009. In the morning, we worked at two steps of the Sword Dance. To do this dance really well requires physical fitness and technical accomplishment well beyond most of us in the class; yet anyone with a good country dancing technique can easily learn the basic sequence of movements, and will enjoy extending their repertoire of steps beyond those used in country dancing. Most steps consist of four repetitions of the same pattern, which allows for easy recovery after the inevitable memory lapses.

In the afternoon, we studied 'A Tribute to J.L.McKenzie'. This dance, which is in a slowish 3/4 measure, emphasises graceful, gently-flowing movements, in contrast to the angular style of the Sword Dance. There are sections of fast, intricate footwork alternating with slow, controlled

movement- all very hard to execute with any sense of continuity, and also very unforgiving to the memory! This really is a virtuous piece. We were all greatly amused at our attempts to achieve the nearly impossible!

The day was strenuous, instructive and entertaining. I think we all came away with experience which, as well as being valuable in its own right, will improve all our dancing. *Geoff Hodges*

As I had the key and the very important refreshments I arrived early at the Highland Day Course at Adel. Our teacher Catherine Livesey was not far behind me. We waited and waited, then, just as I was relishing a private lesson, a whole bus load turned up. It was a nice full room that, after a warm up, started off attempting to do a highland setting step. It isn't so easy to transfer from 3 to 2 beats and Eileen Murray now has our sympathy for learning this in reverse. Next we launched into a sword dance with some giggling and kicking of swords and mixed degrees of success. Following a break for lunch and some changes of pupils we tackled a dance in the most unusual 3/4 time. It was novel and fun and although not mastered by all, especially me, we all enjoyed it and would be happy to try it again.

The RSCDS AGM - A Brief Report

Brief for two reasons: not a lot happened, and I was rather more interested in addressing a nasty cold with a hot whisky and lemon than in taking copious notes.

After last year's fireworks, it was mostly pretty low key. But as the delegates entered the main hall, they were presented with a multi-coloured document titled '2008 -2009 Financial Highlights'.

You may remember that in 2008 the newly elected chairman, Alex Gray, announced his intention of ensuring that the Society should be back in the black by 2009. The efforts that had already been put in place had worked. The Society's General Fund showed a positive balance of over £25,000 this year, as opposed to a deficit of almost £115,000 last year. A fair amount of money had been expended from the Jean Milligan Memorial Fund - but that is what it is there for, to be spent helping to achieve the Society's objectives, capital as well as interest if a good case can be made out.

The financial report really was the highlight, and a genuine success. But those who attended the Leeds Branch AGM may remember agreeing to second an amendment, drafted by the Leicester Branch, to the Society's new constitution. The amendment aimed to limit the effect of one particular clause which stated that an elected member of the Management Board 'may be

removed by majority resolution of the Management Board', which seemed to Leicester, and to us, to be a rather undemocratic way of going on.

Keith Oughton from Leicester proposed the amendment to the meeting, and on your behalf I seconded it. The amendment passed by a huge majority. I don't have the figures, but from memory it was something like 230 for, 30 against.

Following the meeting I was in discussion with a group of acquaintances, and remarked that I was surprised the MB hadn't defended the original proposal more robustly. Someone else remarked 'It wasn't defensible' - and that was Alan Mair, a former Society chairman!

Apart from that, all the usual business was done. People elected, scrolls presented, reports applauded, etc etc. Rumour has it that the two dances were good, and Sue Porter's class well supported, and the Q&A session with the Management Board heirachy much appreciated. And so on.

But I was off for another hot whisky and lemon.

Day School - 19th September

A good day of dancing enjoyed by all. Here are a few of your comments.

The nervous glances of a dozen less experienced dancers were exchanged as Catherine led us through the warm-up movements - some familiar, some less so. The smooth succession of four dancers, followed by a second, and a third group was rather uneven - with occasional lengthy pauses before all felt confident to set off across the hall. Catherine put great emphasis on good, rhythmic stepping; we managed to move forwards with a certain grace, but backward movement was more haphazard, despite her excellent example and explanation.

Several of our number had been keeping late nights prior to the Day School, and the concentration they needed for the dances Catherine taught us was taxed to the utmost. However, everyone cooperated to try and complete the dances in a recognisable manner, and we were delighted when we executed the figures in approximately the time allocated.

By the end of the morning, we felt we knew every inch of the floor intimately and we had moved forward a

step change in our Scottish Country Dancing skills. A very enjoyable and educative session! Lucinda Hodges (RSCDS Bramhall Branch).

I arrived at my first day school with a mixture of anticipation and anxiety. I have been dancing for just over a year and I was anxious that I would know enough of the figures and be able to keep up with the more experienced dancers. I didn't need to worry. I soon met up with some familiar faces from my regular weekly class and also some dancers that I hadn't met before and everyone was very friendly and welcoming.

Once the class started I knew that I had made the right decision to come.

Mervyn's style of teaching was clear, patient and very encouraging, and I found that my technique improved as we practised the steps, all beautifully demonstrated by Mervyn.

In the morning session we put our step practice to good use in some social dances, and I found that I could tackle them with confidence. In the afternoon session aptly called 'Unusual Social Dances' we learnt some delightfully unfamiliar dances, one of which Mervyn had written himself, which were great fun. Throughout the day we were accompanied by excellent and uplifting music performed by lan Slater.

By the end of the afternoon my feet

ached and my legs were tired but the whole day was most enjoyable and very rewarding. I will have no hesitation in signing up for the next day school! Jane Walford (Leeds)
