

## NORMAN FOSTER

I was saddened to hear of Norman's death quite recently and in speaking to his family have realised that his life story has strangely turned full circle.

Norman was born in Leeds and spent his early years here before the family moved to Helensburgh when he was nine. Aged eleven he returned to boarding school in Yorkshire at Ashville College, Harrogate. He remained there (going home to Scotland for holidays) until he was old enough to take up an apprenticeship in

It was here he met Joan when she was only fifteen and later married just before a promotion for Norman took the young couple to Belfast during the war. It was in Northern Ireland that Peter and Stephen were born. It was here too that Norman and Joan became members of the Belfast Branch and their interest in Scottish Country dancing developed.

After 25 years a further work move brought the Foster family back to Yorkshire and naturally they contacted the Leeds Branch. Norman quickly was drawn into Branch activities and became a very active member of the Branch committee from 1967 until 1972. During that time he was branch chairman for three years. It was at this time of his life that we in Leeds got to know Norman and his family. He was always full of fun and as I said at the AGM great to have in a demonstration team as he could always raise a laugh and relax everyone.

A life-long interest of Norman's was building scale models of steam engines. He created every part himself and with such high quality workmanship the models were borrowed by the railway museum in York! His inventive mind created a full size linear loom in the late 1940s. Due to a disagreement about patenting it, it was dismantled and left for a Swiss inventor to build one some ten years later.

An interesting life has been unfolded to me and now to you. Members who knew Norman will I'm sure remember him as a cheerful dancer and fun to be around with.

Condolences were sent from the Branch to Joan and her family.
