

DANCE TRIVIAL

The well known dance "The Machine Without Horse" is not, as one might imagine, a modern dance making reference to the early motor car, as it first appeared in print about 1770. John Rutherford succeeded his brother about 1770 and continued a long established London firm of music publishers. Amongst the many publications of this firm was a "Compleat collection of ... 200 .. country dances with ye newest figures and directions to each tune ... Vol.3" which contained the music and instructions for Machine Without Horses.

It is thought that the name may refer to the Sedan Chairs then in vogue in the larger towns but this is by no means certain. This dance appears on the July Branch Social Dance Programme, see what you think.

Kingussie Flower, a dance which was very popular a few years ago, was devised in the late 19th century by David Anderson a dancing master from Dundee. In the summer periods, Anderson travelled the country areas teaching in towns and villages as he went. This dance was named after one of the places at which he taught. The tune is taken from a 19th century book of songs which was found by Miss Milligan.
