Meet Your New Committee

Following the Branch AGM on October and the new Committee's first meeting in early December, when jobs were allocated for the coming year, we can now announce who is doing what!

First a warm welcome to **Marion Walbank as our new Chair.** Marion has already been visiting classes and events to meet as many of you as possible, but will already be known to those who attended social dances last year as the cheerful face of the catering Co-ordinator. She heads our 'strategic planning' for the future development of the Branch as well as keeping us on our toes with current projects such as the Family Ceilidhs. Obviously she chairs our Committee meetings and is one of our three elected Officers who are Trustees for the Charity Commission. Marion is also one of our current named delegates to the Society AGM next November

Alan Horsfall was re-elected by the Committee at their first meeting as Vice-Chair.

He stands in for the Chair when required and as current 'Father' of the Committee keeps us right on history and custom. Apart from his duties as Vice Chair, crucially, he is the person who researches, contacts and books the bands who play for our social dances, normally up to two years ahead! He is also one of the organisers of the popular Malhamdale Weekend course and a popular MC at social dances.

Ray Williams, our Treasurer, is the second Trustee. He was co-opted early last year and was confirmed in post at the 2019 AGM. The Branch Treasurer is our book-keeper and is responsible (jointly with the Chair, Secretary and Assistant Treasurer) for our bank accounts. He produces the end-of year audited accounts and reports for the Branch at our AGM, and for annual returns to RSCDS Head Office and the Charities Commission.

Evelyn Davidson was also confirmed as **Secretary**, the third Officer and Charity Trustee. She deals with Branch correspondence - nowadays mostly by email. The Secretary books venues for dances, ceilidhs and most classes, dealing with contracts with the venues and legal obligations. She also liaises with Membership Secretary and Head Office on membership matters, and ensures our returns are accurate and the HO website kept up to date. She produces the annual report to HO and Charities Commission on the activities of the Branch, ensuring that these activities have met our charitable obligations. She also books the MCs for social dances, and collects their programmes in time for wider publication to teachers and classes. She is also the second named delegate to the next Society AGM.

We have a new post of **Assistant Treasurer**, formerly approved at the AGM. **John Pugh**, had agreed to this role on being elected to the Committee in 2018, when no-one stood for the post of Treasurer. He was duly approved by the Committee (confirmed at the AGM 2019) and has handled the majority of day to day receiving and banking of monies from classes and dances since joining the Committee, and is usually to be seen 'on the door' at dances. We hope both he and Ray will shortly have the long-awaited online banking permissions, which will at last bring our banking procedures up to date.

Our **Minute Secretary is Jill Woodman**, who takes notes at all Committee meetings, the AGM and any Special Meetings and then writes up the formal Minutes - a challenging task. She keeps the current Minute Book.

Elisabeth Pugh is our Catering Co-ordinator, taking over from Marion. Her job is to see that the interval refreshments at social dances and ceilidhs for both dancers and bands is provided, served and cleared up. She needs a rota of volunteers to provide a couple of helpers at each event. Please let her know if you are willing to do a shift - helpers get discount at dances!

Our **Day School Co-ordinator is Nicola Waugh**, who plans and organises the annual September Day School. Currently she also keeps our Facebook page up to date.

Another warm welcome to our newest recruit as a **Committee member: Sharon Taylor.** Sharon is a relatively new, but enthusiastic dancer, who can remind the 'old hands' what it is like to be a new dancer learning dances and customs, and attending social dances and workshops for the first few times.

There are also two ex-officio non-voting members of the Committee:

Membership Secretary, Brenda Burnell, who keeps the paper membership forms and deals with renewals and new members. She also teaches a class almost every Thursday of the year, and produces the beautiful handwritten posters of the programme for our social dances.

And **Christine Parker-Jones, the Shop Manager,** who not only manages our wonderful shop which keeps us in the black, and contributes her extensive IT skills with help for the eUpdate and transferring the membership data to electronic formats suitable for the 21st century, but is an enthusiastic source of ideas for recruiting new members.

First Impressions

I just booked in time for one of the last places at the November Malhamdale weekend 2019, without knowing clearly what to expect.

Having had nearly a month of rain, the weekend forecast was for cold, clear, sunny skies, and with registration not until 4pm on the Friday, I made the most of the lovely weather, walking for a few hours further up Malhamdale, arriving at Newfield Hall just after 4pm. I thought I might be one of the first to register, but to my astonishment I found most people had already arrived and were tucking in with gusto to tea and cake! I thought I wouldn't know anyone, but was delighted to find a number of people I knew from the Leeds and Askwith dances.

Newfield Hall belongs to HF Holidays and is a beautiful old 19th century house, set in lovely rural grounds. It had just been refurbished, so I was seeing it at its best and it was (almost) exclusively ours for the whole weekend.

I just had time for a swim (yes, they have a

very reasonably sized swimming pool) before dinner at 7pm. The meals are sumptuous with a number of choices for starters, mains and desserts, all beautifully presented and delicious. Mind you, I hardly cook at all, so I'm grateful for anything prepared! But no, it really was excellent food. More than that, and in common with all HF houses, you eat at round tables of six or eight. Seats are not reserved and you sit with different people each meal, so it is a very sociable occasion and a good way to meet new Scottish dancers. Some had come quite a distance, including folk from Nottingham, Somerset, Leicester and London. There were about 45 of us altogether, the number being restricted by the size of the dance floor, not the number of bedrooms.

The Friday and Saturday evening dances started almost as soon as the meal was finished, but I noticed no-one had any trouble dancing on utterly full stomachs! The dance programmes were not too difficult so all could enjoy the dances, and with excellent re-capping from Alan Horsfall and excellent accordion playing from Alan Ross, they were most enjoyable evenings. Chatting with others after the dances with a nightcap by an open fire, just rounded off the day very nicely.

The dining room outside wall is all window and on Saturday morning while tucking in to a full English breakfast (shouldn't that be Scottish?) we were treated to a stunning view of frosted fields and silhouetted bare trees against a rising sun. Unforgettable. Time off on Saturday afternoon gave us a chance to be outside and enjoy a walk. Two of us walked up by the side of Malham Cove and across the pavement before returning to Malham via Janet's Foss. A lovely ramble which just fitted into the two free hours before the walk-through practice for the Saturday evening dance.

Ruby Wilkinson was our teacher for the two class sessions on Saturday and Sunday mornings. I was very pleased to meet her having just learnt the dance 'Ruby Wilkinson's Farewell to Cranshaw'. She made the sessions most enjoyable and good fun. Just a few stretching exercises, then into learning dances which most of us had not done before. We had a lot of laughs, especially over 'Double Posties Jig' and the final session finished with a wild rendition of The Willow Tree'. Surprisingly, there was only one injury!

So Malhamdale turned out to be a wonderful immersive experience which I would thoroughly recommend. Indeed, I enjoyed the weekend so much, I have already booked for 2020!

RSCDS Leeds' Musicians' Group

Here's a taste of what our musicians get up to between the annual Musicians' Day workshops in February.

They play for Irene's Adel class on the Tuesday evening before most Branch social dances, practising putting together 'sets' of music for the repertoire selected by our MCs, as well as learning the 'stop/start/play a few bars and repeat' routine for class musicians.

They also get to see how their speed of delivery and emphasis on the rhythm helps or hinders the dancers as they learn new dances and figures. Definitely a two-way learning experience!

They rehearse as a group twice monthly now at the Chemic Tavern near Hyde Park on Sunday evenings. One night is for dance music, and the other for 'Scottish music, airs and songs'. For the third year running now they have also masterminded the Chemic's Burns Night event on the Saturday nearest Burns Night, when they play a range of Scottish country dance music, airs and songs. They are regularly now supported by a group of Irish musicians, and Anna from the Chemic, who leads the singing of some of Burns' songs. Others amongst the regulars contribute Scottish folk songs and ballads. A haggis supper, complete with neeps and tatties, is served for a modest fee.

Incidentally, I picked up some Burns' facts from Findmypast:- 'During his brief 37 years of life, celebrated Scottish poet Robbie Burns fathered 12 children with four different women... (and he) has over 600 living descendents'. And further trivia haggis has been banned in the US since 1971 because it may contain sheep lung which they will not allow for human consumption! (Should we petition against this ban, as part of our US trade deal??)
