We are still open to offers with a view to trying again, so please let me know if you are interested at all. Currently, the RSCDS is revising the syllabus for the teaching certificates, so when the new one is adopted a résumé will appear in the Newsletter, and that might attract and inspire!

But a really big 'up' has been the response to the White Rose Festival. Not all entries are in yet, but it looks as if we have about thirty adult teams and about ten children's teams. Tickets are still available for the evening dance, so even if you are not dancing in the afternoon I hope you will come to that: 7.00pm to 10.30pm in the Blue Sports Hall at Beckett Park, George Meikle and the Lothian Band.
