

How do we learn to dance and build up a repertoire of dances?

This is something that has always fascinated me ever since I started Scottish dancing. Perhaps I am one of the lucky ones who always enjoyed the technique part of lessons and have been able to remember the dances taught in a lesson. I hasten to add that the latter has not happened without effort on my part. When I first started dancing I always went home from class and wrote down any dances I was taught and similarly I made my own crib sheet before going to a dance. This seemed to help me remember dances and build up my own repertoire. At one count I could tell myself how to do about 400 dances. I have to admit that I find it more difficult now to remember some of the newer dances but I do try to keep the grey cells working.

I am now interested in how dancers do build up their repertoire of dances. Popular dances must help, along with any dance that individual dancers like and really enjoy. Sometimes too you love the tune and that really does tell you how a dance goes. Teachers also help you begin to remember dances. With their progressive teaching you will often dance some dances three weeks in succession and this must help in memorising them. Our White Rose Festival certainly gives you the opportunity to memorise ten dances each year. Do you count sheep if you cannot sleep or do you go over dances for the next dance or Festival?

Over the years I have realised that a small minority can remember dances and an equal number of dancers cannot but then somewhere in the middle there is a huge number, in fact the majority of dancers today, who must have evolved their own system for remembering dances. Do you go to dances and spend your time between dances in looking at crib sheets or the diagrams in Pilling or you just hope the MC will recap or even walk through the next dance? With some dances a crafty move to fourth place will give you a chance to see how a dance goes and where you need to join in. You also get the added bonus of standing out a turn at the top before you become first couple – another chance to watch the dance before you lead it. May I add here that crib sheets and Pilling are only means to remind you

of dances and are not always accurate. If you really want to know how a dance goes, please go back to the original instructions for the full picture.

Teachers play a big part in helping you to memorise dances by minimising their recaps (the less words the better) and sometimes by using rather 'untechnical' terms!

I am not suggesting you learn a dance a day or anything like that but do make your brains work (they do need to be kept working) as well as your feet, arms and legs. A good knowledge of formations and mastery of Scottish dancing language is essential to beginners and along with these a gradual build up of dances makes dancing more enjoyable. Do keep your heads working as well as the rest of you – it's all part of the fun of dancing.
