In early Sept, 50 RSCDS dancers not only from Europe but also Canada, Japan, New Zealand and the U.S.A had an amazing 10 day dancing holiday in Krasnodar and by the Black Sea, organized by Fiona Grant (Bristol) and Ilona Gumenyut of the Kuban Scottish Dancers. We had teachers from the U.K and also New Zealand and San Francisco making it truly international and Scottish Measure provided the music. We spent two weekends in Krasnodar enabling the Russian dancers to join the classes and evening dancing.

On the first Sunday, after classes, we had an excursion to a Cossack restaurant in Krasnodor with lots of food accompanied by music and dancing and later in the day were guests of the Kuban Dancers and were treated to an amazing three hour display of song and dance by various groups of the region, all in beautiful costumes.

Monday saw us on our way for 4 days to the Black Sea to stay at the Yamel Hotel, overlooking the sea and set in the foothills of the beautiful Caucasus Mountains. It had a superb swimming pool and once again lots of lovely food. Whilst there we had two memorable trips, one to Kisilov Rock, a geological feature on the beach. To get there entailed quite a long walk, steep in places, through the forest and a ten-metre rock climb up from the beach, which was quite a challenge. The other trip was to a camp in the

Minister on the Loch

Partying, Etc, in Perth

Well, if I called this piece "Report on the 74th Annual General Meeting of the RSCDS" you'd probably pass hastily to the next article! Which would be a shame, because there is a lot more to what people refer to as "the AGM" than the meeting. But before I get into that, here is a brief summary of the business.

The meeting was held on 1 November in the Gannochy Trust Complex in Perth; organised by HQ, the Perth & Perthshire Branch and a number of other Branches who took responsibility for

other aspects of the weekend. This is an innovation, in the spirit of more involvement all around, which one can only applaud. 257 delegates and 244 observers were present, and, for the first time, postal voting was included in the elections for the Management Board and Committees – so even though Leeds Branch had two reps, we had the three votes we are entitled to, because one could be sent in by post. Not very earth-shaking for us, maybe, but for a Branch like New Zealand with a thousand or so members , another step towards better connections.

The proceedings were in the usual format, conducted with aplomb by Jean Martin of Aberdeen, the current Chairman. This year saw an appearance by one of the Hon Vice Presidents, the Hon. Peregrine Moncreiffe of Moncreiffe. He presented the Scrolls of Honour and it was very pleasant to see one go to Derek Haynes who has taught classes and courses for the Leeds Branch many times, and who dances with us at West Park regularly. Elspeth Gray, the Society's very capable administrator. delivered the Annual Report. This is the end of the first year of the new regime - and she was able to tell us of a number of projects which are getting under way. The long-discussed refurbishment of part of 12, Coates Crescent has at last begun! The new procedure for the appointment of Examiners is nearly settled, the revised exam syllabus has been started. Linda Gaul is to be director of Summer School. Sue Porter takes over as Youth Director. A new Child Protection policy is in place. The programme of updating the recordings goes on, as does the revision of the Manual. The Strategic Plan for 2003-4 has been circulated to Branches and the web-site has been improved. The AGM is now part of the Annual Conference. Medal tests for children are to be introduced. Pocket Editions up to Book 29 are to be put on to CD Rom. The McNab Video project is still alive! And the Bulletin will be out shortly!!

Then Richard Turnbull, chair of the General Purposes and Finance Committee, took centre stage. As Financial Reports go, this was not at all bad! No proposed increase in the subscription. Sales are up (the message is "support your Branch Shop") and although investment income is down, it is not as bad as it might have been. The main preoccupation has been the Society's VAT position. Richard did not attempt to explain this in detail, but pointed out that two experts consulted in the attempt to sort it out, are not in agreement about the situation – so what hope is there that the rest of us will understand! Nothing is resolved, this could be a long-running saga!

Apart from the results of the elections – nothing controversial there- and a very good vote of thanks from Jean Martin, that was it. All over in less than two hours – unlike the five hour



marathon last time it was held in Perth. All in all, my impression is that the new structure has breathed some energy into the Society – let's hope it continues.

Two discussion sessions were held in the morning. The first was called "Branch Forum" and was organised by Berks/Hants/Surrey Border Branch. The topics under discussion were communication, branch interaction, society publications and how we use them and the use of a professional film to promote membership. This is quite a lot to cover in an hour, but it did give branches an opportunity to air their concerns and to suggest possible improvements and new directions. The second was "The Floor is Yours" and was concerned with whether the Society should continue to be a Branch-based organisation, or should become member-based. The case for each was put and a discussion was held. No conclusion emerged.

And then there was the dancing! The Ball on Friday night was splendid – the great advantage of Perth as a venue is that all the dancers can fit into one hall. I think there were about 500 on Friday, but there was plenty of room and Neil Copland provided splendid music. On Saturday the dance was informal and lots more people turned up – David Cunningham and a large number of musicians played and we danced all the old favourites. You could even go to class on Saturday morning, if you had any spare energy!

There were quite a few Leeds Branch members there for the weekend this year, and many of our former dancers who have moved away were there amongst the throng. I think that's the nicest thing about the AGM, you never know who you'll see, only that you'll be pleasantly surprised!

Next year's is in Edinburgh, the weekend of 5/6 November.
